Explanation of the Design of the 1,000-Yen Silver Coins for the 100th Anniversary of the National Park System

Obverse (1.5× enlargement / actual size)

“Mt. Iwate, Japanese serow, and canola flowers”



- The design features Mt. Iwate, together with canola flowers blooming across the foot of the mountain, and a Japanese serow (*Capricornis crispus*), designated as a special national natural treasure.

Reverse (1.5× enlargement / actual size)

“National Parks Unified Logo”



- The design features the “National Parks Unified Logo,” which is created as a symbol for spreading and establishing the value and charms of Japan’s national parks among many people in and outside the country.

Obverse (1.5× enlargement / actual size)

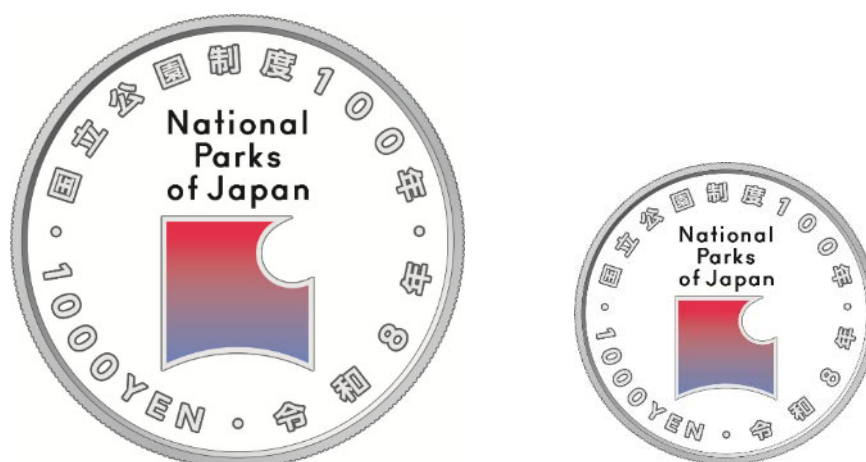
“Mt. Fuji seen from Motohakone and Fuji cherry”



- The design features Mt. Fuji seen from Motohakone located in the southeast shore of Lake Ashinoko, together with the Fuji cherry (*Prunus incisa*).

- The design features Ago Bay, famous for its ria coastline, together with an Akoya pearl oyster (*Pinctada fucata*), and an *Ama* (female diver).
